You Should See What They Are Doing!

Last night I had the opportunity to attend a CTE Advisory Meeting and Open House at Rice Lake High School. CTE stands for Career and Technical Education, and is applied to educational programs that specialize in the skilled trades, applied sciences, modern technologies, and career preparation.

CTE programs offer both academic and career-related courses, and provide students with the opportunity to gain work experience through internships, job shadowing, on-the-job training, and industry-certification opportunities. CTE opportunities provide a wide range of learning experiences covering different career pathways, from skilled trades such as automotive technology, construction, plumbing, or electrical contracting to fields as diverse as agriculture, architecture, graphic design, culinary arts, fashion design, filmmaking, forestry, engineering, healthcare, personal training, robotics, or veterinary medicine.

I was able to see and learn more about what students and teachers are doing differently, including the partnerships that have been and continue to be formed with businesses and individuals in our local area. A few examples of what our students have done or are doing include designing and building canoes, designing and producing finished graphic design projects, engineering and manufacturing products such as golf clubs, designing and participating in true business simulations, producing finished food products such as smoked meat products, and graduating from high school having obtained certifications that lead to meaningful employment. To complement this, the facility additions and upgrades provided for in the last referendum have been key to helping provide the spaces and equipment to make this happen. I was truly impressed!

■ Keyboarding is an important skill for elementary students. The computer-based state test given to 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> graders requires students to be able to keyboard answers to the questions. Students who are able to keyboard will have an easier time with the technology skills required by the test.



■ How can you help your child be a better keyboarder?

Practice keyboarding using keyboarding websites.

Go to <http://goo.gl/muaTuk> for a list of websites. There is a Tab on this website called “Access School Network at Home” which provides directions for students to log into their school account and go to *Type to Learn* which is the keyboarding program students can use.

The main skills to focus on:

- a. Keep fingers positioned on the home row. The Home row is the middle row of the keyboard (ASDF JKL;) Students are taught to begin with their fingers on this row each time they keyboard.
- b. Look at computer screen while keyboarding and not at fingers
- c. Focus on accuracy and not on speed (this will come with practice.)
